If you don't like the way part of your practice is going, get involved and be part of the solution. All Academy members are invited to attend the Board of Governors meeting at the beginning of the convention.

Now is the time to join Project 535. You can sign up to meet your local congressional representative in August during the congressional recess. Reach out to Brad Gruehn at <a href="mailto:bgruen@entnet.org">bgruen@entnet.org</a> or cell phone (202)262-2090 and our Academy will help arrange a personal meeting with your local representative at your office or over coffee, etc. to share your real-world, day to day concerns facing your otolaryngology practice. You can also sign up as a state tracker to join monthly discussions of events happening across our otolaryngology community.

One example of the GSO legislative efforts occurred on May 5<sup>th</sup> when the Academy outreach member, Harry DeCabo, reached out the GSO Board to ask for support in opposing H.R. 2757 that involves greater and inappropriate Audiology scope of practice. Legislation (<u>H.R. 2757</u>) which would inappropriately expand the scope of practice of audiologists and put patients at risk has once again been introduced in the 119<sup>th</sup>Congress. <u>Representatives Gus Bilirakis (R-FL) and Kevin Mullin (D-CA) introduced the House version of the bill on April 10.</u> This legislation would provide audiologists with direct access to Medicare patients, would reclassify audiologists as providers under Medicare, and ultimately put patients at risk by undermining physician-led team care. Similar to our efforts in the 118<sup>th</sup> Congress, a letter signed-on by the GSO, has been sent to Congress opposing this bill. We send a strong message of opposition with this sign-on letter while maintaining the current excellent care relationship amongst our audiology colleagues that truly benefits our patients.





## **CLINICAL SPOTLIGHT: Building Momentum in Otology at MCG**

The Otology and Neurotology division at the Medical College of Georgia is experiencing a season of meaningful growth and programmatic renewal — one rooted in patient-centered care, interdisciplinary collaboration, and a renewed emphasis on surgical education.



Recent educational expansions include the establishment of an audiology externship, providing robust training in a collaborative environment and further integrating audiologic care within the academic mission. Meanwhile, hands-on surgical education continues to evolve: the department is preparing for the dedication of its newly named temporal bone laboratory, and has committed to doubling the frequency of its resident temporal bone course — now offered twice annually to ensure early and sustained exposure to temporal bone anatomy and otologic technique.



#### **Massive Retropharyngeal Plexiform Neurofibroma**



An 11 year-old male with past medical history of seizures, autism, developmental delay, obstructive sleep apnea, and neurofibromatosis type 1 presented to an outside hospital due to seizures, and he was intubated at that time. Contrasted MRI neck was obtained, which showed a large, plexiform neurofibroma involving the retropharyngeal space (**Figure 1A**) and causing severe airway compromise. There were also noted neurofibromas involving the cervical rootlets that extended to and caused widening of the right neural foramina at C2-3 and C3-4. These caused contouring of the right lateral aspect of the thecal sac, contributing to mild spinal canal stenosis at C3-4. There was also noted encasement of the right parapharyngeal internal carotid artery (**Figure 1B**). He was then transferred to the Children's Hospital of Georgia for further surgical evaluation. After multidisciplinary discussion, concern remained for possible malignant conversion, and 18-FDG PET/CT was obtained. This demonstrated low-level heterogeneous avidity with no concern for malignancy (**Figure 1C**).

Recommendation was then made for the patient to undergo tracheostomy and debulking of his massive retropharyngeal neurofibroma. The patient was subsequently taken to the operating room for airway exam and tracheostomy. Direct laryngoscopy demonstrated significant retropharyngeal fullness compressing the posterior pharyngeal wall against the epiglottis and complete obstruction of the glottic airway (**Figure 2A**). Tracheostomy was performed uneventfully. The patient then returned to the operating room for staged transcervical excision of his retropharyngeal neurofibroma (**Figure 2B**). Using an anterior cervical spine approach technique, the mass was exposed and its extent was noted to span from the thoracic inlet to the skull base. With a combination of blunt dissection and electrocautery, this mass was carefully excised, taking care to protect the carotid artery and the vagus, recurrent laryngeal, superior laryngeal, and hypoglossal nerves. Post-operatively, the patient progressed well with subsequent resolution of his pharyngeal airway obstruction by post-operative day 6. He was ultimately able to be decannulated while inpatient on post-operative day 8. He continued to demonstrate aspiration across all consistencies post-operatively and was ultimately discharged home with nasogastric tube and plan for aggressive outpatient swallow rehabilitation.
